Suggested Agenda for Legislative Meetings

Introduction (approx. 5 min)

- Thank legislators/staff for their time (LEADER)
- Each attendee makes a brief introduction (< 1 minute each). Suggestion: on Zoom, leader calls on people; in person, go clockwise.
- If you have a legislator that has done something positive for small and microbusiness, mention that (check their website).
- Thank for supporting strong investments in small business in the FY 2021
 Budget (see following pages.)

The Why (the meat of the meeting – approx. 10 minutes)

COVID-19 has highlighted the importance of small businesses in our communities, their challenges and the need to support the ecosystem - coaching, capital, connection and give some impact data and your great stories.

The Ask (approx. 5 min)

- Recovery funds should invest significant resources into communities of color for small business development.
- Funds should be allocated for outreach and admin to enable organizations to be able to reach the hardest to reach entrepreneurs.
- Support the Governor's asks and the additions for small businesses to the budget
 - Pick another bill or two to support.

The Closing (approx. 3-5 min)

- Is there anything you can do for them?
- If feels good invite for a tour of businesses or zoom call if that's more comfortable (optional).

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*Small business emergency budget provisions passed in Feb21 (thank for the support)

- 1) Provided \$2.5 billion in grants to small businesses through the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz). \$50 million was available to assist non-profit cultural institutions.
- 2) Established that federal pandemic assistance loans that were forgiven did not count as state taxable income.
- 3) Two years of license fee relief for restaurants and bars as well as barbering and cosmetology entrepreneurs and businesses

Support for the Governor's proposed budget

CALED developed an excellent summary of the Governor's proposed budget (both January and May-revised). California's surplus puts it in position to invest in the state and its small businesses. We generally are supportive of the items economic development items highlighted by CALED, but here are a few highlights:

- 1) \$1.5 billion for three additional rounds of small business relief grants through GO-Biz (totaling \$4 billion in 2021). \$16 million (from the initial \$50 million) is still available for nonprofit cultural institutions and will be made available in additional rounds.
 - 2) \$100 million for IBank loan and guarantee programs.
 - 3) \$35 million for small business micro-grants in underserved communities.
 - 4) \$100 million in additional Main Street hiring tax credits.
- 5) \$100 million one-time General Fund to establish a local jurisdiction assistance grant program for cannabis.
- 6) \$54.7 million for technical assistance to underserved farmers, new farmer training and manager apprenticeships, and the Fresno-Merced Future of Food Innovation Initiative.
 - 7) \$7 billion for broadband (crucial for small businesses, especially rural ones)
